

Division of Newborn Screening and Genetics Destruction of the Dried Blood Spot Filter Paper

What is newborn screening? Every baby born in Pennsylvania is required to have a Dried Blood Spot (DBS) screening unless it is against religious beliefs or practices. This screening helps detect harmful disorders that may cause serious medical conditions. These conditions can cause death or severe disability.

How does your baby get screened? A few drops of blood from your baby's heel are put on a DBS filter paper. That filter paper is then sent to the state contracted laboratory to be tested for harmful disorders that you cannot see when your baby is born.

What happens after the blood is tested? DBS filter papers are kept by the state contracted laboratory for one year. The lab will perform quality control testing before destruction. DBS filter papers are also available for additional testing, forensic purposes or release with parent/guardian consent. DBS filter papers are never permitted to be used for research unless a parent/guardian consents to release.

Can a DBS filter paper be destroyed before one year? Destruction of a DBS filter paper can occur any time after screening, even before the child turns 1, if requested by the parent/guardian.
